True believers in Jesus don't need a "secondary plan" for salvation and eternal life. They need to follow the actions of Jesus Christ, according to Pastor Greg Lee of Suncrest Christian Church in St. John. "Followers of Jesus - church people - tend to forget that following Jesus is the way to get to heaven. But they've somehow constructed a different way in their mind by beating people into it, or convincing people about it, or telling people they're wrong," Lee says. On this week's show, Lee joins us in the studio to examine the gospel about Jesus Christ and why too many Christians don't act Christ-like in their daily lives. "If you look at who Jesus had his harshest words for, it was for religious people who were harsh to people who were on the margins," Lee tells Jerry, who's been on the margins of spirituality for decades. Our legacy businesses also innovate — BP's Hydrogen Hub project, Arcelor-Mittal's East Chicago research center developing lighter weight, stronger steel, and Alverno Laboratories' medical testing innovations. Other examples abound.

The second activity deserving more recognition is World Civility Day. This annual, day-long event, always held on the second Thursday of April, was conceived of eight years ago by Chuck Hughes, Executive Director of the Gary Chamber of Commerce. Well designed and meaningful, this event seeks to help overcome the divisiveness and sometimes outright nastiness that seems to be plaguing our polarized society. Small group discussions and an evening keynote address by a prominent individual make this event well worth the time.

The third organization is the Shared Ethics Advisory Commission (SEAC). This all-volunteer effort was formed in 2005 by a small group of private citizens and local government officials with the goal of bringing ethics training to local government employees. To date, twenty-three Northwest Indiana communities have joined this effort, agreeing to provide training on ethical decision-making for all their employees. SEAC also hosts an annual Ethics Summit. This half-day event is open to the general public free of charge. Each election season, SEAC also asks every local candidate to commit to employee ethics training and support for effective whistle blower protection.

Three very different organizations, but with the common purpose of encouraging the growth and development of a community we can be proud of. As noted, there are many other examples and I invite others to write about them. Let's put the spotlight on the good things all around us.
